

Bihar's SIR and the Burden of Proof: Women at the Centre of Voter Deletions



The Election Commission's (EC) Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in Bihar has brought to light troubling patterns that run counter to established Supreme Court precedent. A close examination of the deletions reveals that women, particularly those under the age of 40, have borne the brunt of exclusions under the "permanently shifted" category. This not only raises concerns about gendered bias in voter roll management but also about the risk of disenfranchising thousands of citizens who may be left without registration in any constituency.

Gendered Deletions and Patterns

The EC, following a Supreme Court directive, released the full dataset of nearly 65 lakh deletions, including the reasons for each removal. A first striking trend was the disproportionate exclusion of women—about seven lakh more female electors were deleted compared to men. When this dataset was disaggregated further, the imbalance became

clearer: in the "permanently shifted" category, 62.6% of those removed were women, while men accounted for only 37.4%. When age was factored into the analysis, the divide became sharper. Among voters aged 18–29, women outnumbered men by three to one in this category, while in the 30–49 cohort, they outnumbered men two to one. By contrast, there were no major gender differences in the "not found," "duplicate enrolment," or "deceased" categories. This points toward a uniquely gendered process of exclusion linked to the way migration is interpreted during field verification.

Migration as the Hidden Driver

Census 2011 data provides context for these patterns. Out of Bihar, nearly 17.7 lakh women had migrated due to marriage, compared to just 43,000 men. In contrast, male out-migration was overwhelmingly tied to work, with 21.2 lakh men leaving for employment, compared to 1.5 lakh

women. Overall, migrant men still outnumbered women by about 2.5 lakh, but women's migration was largely linked to marital relocation rather than temporary or seasonal work. This suggests why younger women are disproportionately marked as "permanently shifted." Once they move to their husband's home, BLOs (Booth Level Officers) visiting their natal address may not find them and record them as permanently shifted—even if they have not yet registered in their new constituency. Male migrants, on the other hand, are often coded as "not found" or may remain on rolls at their parental address if family members report them as occasional returnees. This discrepancy in coding practices partly explains the gender imbalance.

Legal Concerns: Burden of Proof

Beyond the statistical imbalance lies a deeper constitutional question. In Lal Babu Hussein vs. Electoral Registration Officer (1995), the Supreme Court ruled that due process must precede any deletion and that electors cannot be treated as if they must constantly re-prove their eligibility without cause. Critics argue that the SIR flips this principle: voters are being asked to prove their presence or face deletion. While the EC defends the process as a clean-up exercise, petitioners contend that it effectively transfers the burden of proof onto vulnerable groups—especially the poor, women, and migrants—who are least equipped to navigate bureaucratic procedures. The Supreme Court's interim orders in August 2025 sought to restore some balance: the EC was compelled to publish all deletions with reasons, accept Aadhaar and other documents for enrolment, and enable online claims.

Risk of Disenfranchisement

The stakes are high. Indian law prohibits dual

enrolment—citizens cannot be registered in two constituencies at once. Therefore, if a woman is deleted from Bihar's rolls as "permanently shifted" but has not yet applied in her new place of residence, she will effectively be left without voting rights anywhere. Male labour migrants face a similar risk, though the coding differences mean fewer are flagged as permanently shifted in one sweep. This raises troubling questions about democratic participation. Is the state ensuring that deletions are followed by enrolments at new addresses? Or is it merely excising names without facilitating reregistration? The latter would disenfranchise precisely those groups—young women, the mobile poor—that democracy ought to empower.

The Bihar SIR illustrates the perils of a mass deletion exercise that disregards lived realities of migration and gender. Women, especially younger women who move after marriage, have been disproportionately marked as "permanently shifted." This reflects not illiteracy or apathy, but structural patterns of mobility. Meanwhile, the law cautions against making voters shoulder the burden of constantly proving their presence. The Supreme Court's interventions have opened a path toward greater transparency, but questions remain unresolved. Unless the EC develops mechanisms to link deletions with seamless re-enrolment, millions risk being stranded outside the electorate. The right to vote, central to citizenship, cannot hinge on whether a young bride in Bihar files Form 6 on time or whether a migrant worker is marked absent rather than shifted. The debate over the SIR is not merely about data—it is about the future of electoral justice in India.

Rethinking the Past: Understanding the Recent Changes in the NCERT History Syllabus

In a country as diverse and pluralistic as India, the teaching of history carries deep implications for national identity, collective memory and civic understanding. The recent revisions in the National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) history textbooks have reignited debates around pedagogy, politics and representation in school curricula. As a historian and educator, it is imperative to analyse the reasons behind these changes and reflect on their broader significance.

Why Were the Changes Made?

According to official statements by the NCERT, the revisions are part of a broader curriculum rationalisation effort aimed at reducing student workload and aligning textbooks with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. The post-pandemic era has exposed students to academic backlogs and NCERT claims that "overlapping" and "irrelevant" content has been trimmed to help ease learning.

However, the history syllabus has attracted particular attention because some of the omitted content touches upon politically sensitive themes. Chapters and references related to the Mughal Empire, caste-based discrimination, and communal violence during the Gujarat riots have been either shortened or removed, prompting critics to argue that this sanitises India's historical narrative.

The Significance of these Changes

- 1. Reframing National Identity: Every history syllabus reflects what a society chooses to remember. The removal or inclusion of certain chapters directly shapes how students perceive their nation's past. Critics argue that the marginalisation of Mughal history or the underrepresentation of social reform movements affects the pluralistic ethos of India's narrative. Proponents, on the other hand, claim the aim is to give equal space to lesser-covered indigenous dynasties and historical contributions from other regions.
- 2. Aligning with NEP 2020: The NEP emphasises experiential and thematic learning over rote memorisation. The restructuring of the syllabus is also meant to make history more engaging by focusing on key concepts rather than dense chronological accounts. This shift could make history more accessible to students, but it must be balanced carefully with factual integrity.

- 3. Political and Cultural Narratives: Historical revisionism is not new. Textbooks across the world reflect evolving political ideologies. In the Indian context, the current government's emphasis on indigenous knowledge systems and civilizational pride is mirrored in the curriculum. While reclaiming neglected histories is important, selective omission risks creating a skewed version of the past.
- 4. Pedagogical Concerns: From an academic standpoint, abrupt deletions without adequate substitution weaken a student's understanding of the complexity of Indian history. A critical understanding of events like the Emergency, Partition, or the contributions of social reformers is essential for developing analytical thinking and democratic citizenship.

Looking Ahead

History must be dynamic, evolving with new research and interpretations. However, changes should be transparent, academically grounded, and consultative. If reforms are seen as politically motivated rather than pedagogically driven, they risk eroding public trust in educational institutions.

As history educators, our responsibility is to encourage inquiry, foster empathy, and equip students with tools to critically examine multiple perspectives. The classroom must remain a space where historical truths are not dictated, but discovered — through evidence, dialogue and reasoned debate.

Conclusion

The recent changes in the NCERT history syllabus are more than administrative tweaks — they reflect India's ongoing dialogue with its past. Whether these changes serve the purpose of inclusive education or ideological conformity is a question that educators, parents and policymakers must confront together. After all, how we teach history determines how we imagine our future.

Bloom's Taxonomy: Building Blocks of Effective Learning

Bloom's Taxonomy is important because it helps students understand how learning happens step by step. It encourages them to move beyond simple memorization and develop higher-order thinking skills like analyzing, evaluating, and creating.

What is Bloom's Taxonomy?

Bloom's Taxonomy is a framework used to classify educational goals and skills that teachers want students to achieve, often called learning objectives. It was first introduced in 1956 by Benjamin Bloom, an educational psychologist at the University of Chicago. Over time, the taxonomy has been updated and is now divided into six levels of learning. These levels help in planning lessons, creating learning objectives, and designing assessments:

Remembering – Recalling or recognizing facts and basic concepts from memory.

Understanding – Explaining ideas or concepts through interpretation, summarization, classification, and comparison.


Applying – Using knowledge in new situations or carrying out specific tasks.

Analyzing – Breaking down information to understand relationships, patterns, and structure.

Evaluating – Making judgments using standards and criteria through critique or assessment.

Creating – Combining elements in new ways to form original ideas, solutions, or products.

Bloom's Taxonomy is hierarchical. Higher-order skills build upon lower-level ones. Often represented as a pyramid, it can also be viewed as a "layered cake," where each level forms the foundation for the next



How Bloom's Taxonomy Supports Course Design Bloom's Taxonomy helps instructors understand how learning develops:

You must remember information before you can understand it.

You must understand before you can apply concepts.

You must analyze before you can evaluate.

You must evaluate before you can create something new.

However, not every topic requires progressing through all levels. For beginners (e.g., freshmen or introductory courses), focus on lower levels like remembering and understanding, while gradually introducing applying and analyzing. For advanced learners (e.g., seniors or graduate students), emphasize higher-order skills like evaluating and creating.

अगर आप भी आसमान छुने का सपना देखते हैं, तो शुभांश् शुक्ला की कहानी आपके लिए एक मिसाल है। लखनऊ के रहने वाले शुभांश ने यह साबित कर दिया कि किसी भी सामान्य परिवार से आने वाला युवा भी कडी मेहनत और सपनों के दम पर अंतरिक्ष तक पहंच सकता है। 10 अक्टूबर 1985 को जन्मे शुभांशु बचपन से ही पढ़ाई में तेज और अनुशासित थे। उन्होंने सिटी मॉन्टेसरी स्कूल से पढ़ाई की और कॉलेज के सपनों को छोड़, NDA की परीक्षा दी— वह भी अपनी बहन की शादी के दिन चुपचाप निकलकर। यह उनके जुनून का पहला बड़ा कदम था।NDA से पास होने के बाद वे भारतीय वायु सेना में पायलट बने। उन्होंने मिग, सुखोई और जैगुआर जैसे खतरनाक लड़ाकू विमान उड़ाए। हजारों घंटे की उड़ानों के बाद उन्हें "टेस्ट पायलट" का दर्जा मिला — यानी ऐसा पायलट जो नए विमानों की जांच करता है।लेकिन उनकी असली उडान 2025 में हुई, जब उन्होंने अमेरिका से अंतरराष्ट्रीय अंतरिक्ष स्टेशन (ISS) के लिए उडान भरी। Axiom Mission-4 नामक इस मिशन


में वे भारत के पहले ऐसे युवा बने जो 41 साल बाद फिर से अंतरिक्ष में पहुंचे। उन्होंने वहाँ मेथी उगाने से लेकर मानव शरीर पर माइँक्रोग्रैविटी का असर देखने तक कई प्रयोग किए। उनकी वापसी भी आसान नहीं थी — उन्हें फिर से धरती पर चलना सीखना पड़ा। लेकिन वे डटे रहे, और युवाओं को दिखा दिया कि चुनौतियाँ भी चढ़ाई का हिस्सा होती हैं।प्रधानमंत्री मोदी ने उन्हें "भारत का चंद्रयान क्षण" कहा, और देशभर के युवाओं को शुभांशु से सीख लेने की प्रेरणा दी। शुभांशु की प्रती कामना मिश्रा ने सोशल मीडिया पर एक पोस्ट में लिखा कि "इस बार सिर्फ मेरा सपना पूरा नहीं हुआ, बल्कि करोड़ों युवाओं को उड़ान मिली है।"शुभांशु शुक्ला की कहानी हमें यह सिखाती है कि सपनों की कोई सीमा नहीं होती। अगर आप अपने लक्ष्य के लिए पूरी ईमानदारी और समर्पण से मेहनत करते हैं, तो कोई भी सितारा दूर नहीं।तो दोस्तों, अब आपकी बारी है – क्या आप भी अपने जीवन का "अंतरिक्ष मिशन" शुरू करने के लिए तैयार हैं?




