

The Israel-Iran Conflict: A Global Concern with Far-Reaching Implications for India

The escalating tensions between Israel and Iran are sending shockwaves across the world—and for good reason.

One of the most jarring images from the conflict was the strike on an Iranian TV station while its most prominent female anchor, a mother of two, was live on air. This moment is just one of many chilling scenes emerging from the war zone.

For India, the situation presents a delicate diplomatic challenge. The country must protect its critical energy interests, sustain regional connectivity projects, and manage its security partnerships—all while maintaining a neutral and pragmatic stance on the global stage.

Energy and Trade Woes

The intensifying conflict between Israel and Iran could have severe economic repercussions for India, particularly in energy security and trade.

India relies on the Persian Gulf for more than 80% of its crude oil imports, with a significant portion passing through the Strait of Hormuz—a narrow waterway controlled by Iran. Any military escalation or blockade in this region could disrupt oil supplies, driving up global prices and inflating India's import costs.

During the 2019 tanker crisis in the Gulf, shipping insurance premiums surged by 20%, and oil prices spiked by 4-5%, forcing India to consider expensive rerouting and stockpiling measures.

Trade with both nations is also at risk. India's bilateral trade with Israel reached \$10.1 billion in FY 2023, covering defence, technology, and agriculture. Meanwhile, trade with Iran, though diminished due to U.S. sanctions, remains crucial for items like dry fruits, fertilizers, and urea. Further instability could restrict access to these goods or make them more expensive.

Additionally, the International North-South Transport Corridor (INSTC), which links India to Russia and Central Asia via Iran, faces delays due to security and sanctions concerns, jeopardizing India's efforts to reduce dependence on Chinabacked trade routes.

Basmati Rice Trade under Strain

The conflict is also impacting India's Basmati rice exports, particularly from Punjab and Haryana. Iran is one of the largest buyers of Indian Basmati, importing over 8.55 lakh metric tonnes in 2024–25,

worth ₹6,374 crore. In peak years, Iran accounts for 30-35% of India's total Basmati exports.

However, rising tensions and existing payment delays are causing problems. Many private Iranian importers now take six to eight months to settle payments, straining Indian traders. Even Iran's government-backed Government Trading Corporation (GTC) has delayed payments by up to 180 days. As a result, some Indian exporters are diverting shipments to other markets, even at lower profits, just to stay afloat.

Financial Markets on Edge

India's financial markets are also feeling the heat. Geopolitical instability in West Asia often triggers investor anxiety. For example, after Iran retaliated for the killing of General Qassem Soleimani in 2020, the Sensex plummeted by 700 points in a single day, and the rupee weakened due to rising oil prices. A prolonged conflict could force the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) to intervene in forex markets and revise inflation forecasts.

On June 13, following reports of Israeli strikes on Iranian nuclear sites, the Sensex dropped 1,300 points, and the Nifty 50 fell below 24,500. Oil and gas stocks, including BPCL, HPCL, and Indian Oil, lost nearly 3.5% as Brent crude surged 9% on fears of Middle East supply disruptions.

Earlier in the week, the Sensex had already fallen 800 points, with major losses in L&T, Infosys, and ICICI Bank as investors braced for costlier crude imports. While markets have since recovered, the episode underscores how vulnerable India remains to West Asian instability.

Chabahar Port: A Strategic Dilemma

India's \$85 million investment in Iran's Chabahar Port—a key gateway to Afghanistan and Central Asia—is now at risk due to the Israel-Iran conflict.

Located near the Gulf of Oman, Chabahar is crucial for India's International North-South Transport Corridor (INSTC). However, with rising tensions, the port is increasingly vulnerable to military strikes or covert sabotage. Recent drone attacks, cyber intrusions, and naval clashes in nearby waters have heightened security concerns.

Worse, if Iran faces harsher Western sanctions due to the conflict, Chabahar's commercial viability could suffer. While the port was previously exempt from U.S. sanctions due to its role in Afghanistan's development, future escalations may jeopardize that exemption.

India's deepening defence ties with Israel further complicate its diplomatic balancing act with Iran. As New Delhi pursues its "Act West" policy, prolonged instability in Iran could derail years of strategic infrastructure planning.

Undersea Cables: The Invisible Lifeline at Risk

Beyond military clashes and oil prices, another critical but overlooked concern is the threat to undersea internet cables, which carry 95% of global data traffic.

Key routes like the Europe India Gateway (EIG), FLAG, and SEA-ME-WE 5 pass through conflict-prone zones near Israel, Iran, the Red Sea, and the Strait of Hormuz. Any damage to these cables—whether accidental or deliberate—could severely disrupt connectivity between Europe and Asia, directly affecting India.

In 2024, three major cables (AAE-1, EIG, and Seacom) were damaged in the Red Sea during regional clashes, causing internet slowdowns across Africa, the Gulf, and South Asia. Indian ISPs were forced to reroute traffic through longer, costlier

paths.

India's \$245 billion digital economy depends heavily on these cables, with over 90% of global data flow transiting through the Middle East. A single cable break can slash bandwidth by 70%, crippling IT exports, cloud services, and financial transactions.

No Longer a Distant Conflict

The Israel-Iran conflict is no longer just a regional issue—it has direct consequences for India's economy, trade, infrastructure, and digital security. From rising oil prices and Basmati trade disruptions to risks facing Chabahar Port and undersea cables, the crisis touches multiple aspects of India's national interests.

As global volatility grows, India must respond with strategic foresight—bolstering energy and digital resilience, safeguarding trade routes, and engaging diplomatically with all sides. In an interconnected world, how India navigates such crises will shape not only its foreign policy success but also its economic stability and long-term strategic influence.

The month of June and the enduring legacy of the Magna Carta on human rights

The Magna Carta, sealed by King John of England on June 15 in 1215, stands as one of the most pivotal legal documents in history. Originally drafted to address the grievances of rebellious barons, its significance far surpassed its medieval origins, laying the groundwork for modern human rights and constitutional governance. At its core, the Magna Carta established the revolutionary principle that even a king must abide by the law—a concept that became the bedrock of justice, liberty, and the rule of law in democratic societies.

One of the most groundbreaking aspects of the Magna Carta was its assertion that no individual, regardless of status, should be deprived of liberty without due legal process. Clause 39 famously declared: "No free man shall be arrested, imprisoned, or deprived of his property except by the lawful judgment of his peers or by the law of the land." This principle, though initially applying only to the nobility, later expanded to protect

all citizens, forming the basis of habeas corpus and fair trial rights in modern legal systems. By challenging absolute monarchy, the Magna Carta planted the seeds for constitutional governance, ensuring that power could not be exercised arbitrarily.

The Magna Carta's influence extended far beyond medieval England, shaping foundational documents of democracy and human rights. Centuries later, its principles inspired the English Bill of Rights (1689), the American Declaration of Independence (1776), and the U.S. Constitution's Bill of Rights (1791). The idea that governments must respect individual freedoms and operate under legal constraints became central to modern democracies. Furthermore, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948) echoed the Magna Carta's spirit by affirming that all people are entitled to justice, equality, and protection from oppression.


Beyond its legal impact, the Magna Carta symbolized the enduring struggle against tyranny. It demonstrated that even the most powerful rulers could be held accountable, a principle that fueled movements for civil liberties and social justice throughout history. While the original document was far from perfect—excluding serfs, women, and marginalized groups—its underlying ideals evolved to promote broader human rights protections. Today, it serves as a reminder that laws must safeguard fundamental freedoms and prevent abuses of authority.

In contemporary times, the Magna Carta remains a powerful symbol of justice and the rule of law. Its legacy is evident in legal systems worldwide that prioritize human dignity, fair trials, and government accountability. Though written over eight centuries ago, its principles continue to resonate, reinforcing the belief that no one is above the law and that freedom must be protected through strong legal frameworks. As societies continue to face challenges to human rights, the Magna Carta's enduring message remains clear: true justice requires equality before the law, restraint on power, and unwavering respect for individual liberties.







